Pastor's Page

¹⁵Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, ¹⁶making the most of the time, because the days are evil. ¹⁷So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. ¹⁸Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, ¹⁹as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, ²⁰giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Since I arrived one of my main frustrations has been what to do with the dwindling 10:30 service on Sunday mornings. My first thoughts were that it would just be best to suspend the 10:30 service for a while and focus on some adult education time, but there are too many problems with this for the congregation as it has arrived at the present schedule through some trial, error and history. My present thought and what I would like to try beginning in the fall will be to change the structure and substance of the service from one that is lectionary based, to a service that will focus on Christian basics -- Basic Bible stories, Small Catechism, and will also try to instruct children and others on the basics of Lutheran worship and the life of faith.

We will not do away with liturgy, but probably simplify it and in most instances move to one Scripture lesson or focus on one thing at a time. We will introduce one possible way in which that might work in the next few weeks of this summer time, by preaching from the First Letter of Peter. We will work on the format of the service in the fall. Part of the introduction of the new service will be to have a series of sermons based on Luther's Small Catechism in the fall. We will use this series at both 9:00 and 10:30 services from September to November. After that, the 9:00 service will move back to the lectionary while the 10:30 service will shift in this new direction.

After the catechism series we will preach through the life of Jesus from Advent to Easter and then through to Pentecost. Though one goal might be educational, the other is to help us see the worship service in a different way. I don't know if it will work or not, but the change does not have to be permanent if it doesn't work out. I hope it will make that service appealing to those who have children in Sunday School and bring more children to worship. My greatest frustration with our present schedule is to see the number of children who participate in Sunday School, but rarely worship. That practice is ultimately self-defeating, because the whole point of knowing God is to come together to worship the God who gives us all good things.

Synod Assembly

The Southwest Minnesota Synod of the ELCA held its annual synod assembly at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter June 12-14. **The 2009 Synod Assembly theme is "Christ, Be Our Light."**

The biblical basis for the assembly is Psalm 119:105. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path." Pastor Anderson, Bonnie Hubert, Shaun and Patrice Luker and Dennis Schmidt attended from Christ the King.

The primary business of the assembly was one of its first actions, to elect the synod's bishop for the next 6 years. Bishop Jon Anderson was re-elected on the first ballot.

Several resolutions related to the ELCA proposed social statement Human Sexuality: Gift and Task and related policy changes were presented for debate and vote. A resolution rejecting the social statement failed to gain a majority, one that rejected the policy changes related to ordination was passed, and a recommendation to require a two-thirds vote on the social statement and policy changes at the Churchwide Assembly also failed.

The proposed synod budget was passed, as were the synod's guidelines for compensation for pastors and associates in ministry.

ELCA Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson was present for the assembly, preaching at the opening worship and giving a report on behalf of the ELCA. He was well received and challenged the congregations and members of the ELCA to fulfill our task to witness to the good news of Jesus Christ in sharing our stories and showing love to those who are in need.

I realized that he died without leaving me a note or a signature, only this rusty tackle box. Then it dawned on me. What if I were to die today, what would I leave for my wife and children? I concluded that I would be leaving nothing but a rusty tackle box too! That's how *Letters from Dad* was born. From there I called 14 other fathers and we started on a journey to leave a legacy to our family. That group birthed a group of 130 men that birthed a group of 350 men and then a group of 700 men. It has now grown to over 700 churches and thousands of men across the globe.

Letters from Dad teaches men to open up their hearts and put into words their love for their wives, children and parents. It not only teaches men "Why" to write letters, the men also learn the mechanics of letter writing and how to keep them safe for posterity. Yet Luther's purpose was to make the life of faith teachable by parents to their children. When it came to faith, Luther might have been seen to ascribe to the KISS (Keep It Simple, well you know the last part) method of passing on the faith. The catechism was a powerful tool for learning and living the faith to which we are called. We will use the catechism as the basis for our worship services from September 6 through November 22.

The goal is sharing the good news, but also to remind us of this little treasure of the church for nurturing faith and life.

Tour de Revs---100 Days for Hunger and Wellness

Dear Pastors and Congregational Leaders of the SW MN Synod,

Have you heard about the Tour de Revs? Briefly, three ELCA pastors are going to ride a custom-made bamboo bicycle built for three (triplet) for 100 days. They are riding to raise awareness of "Hunger & Wellness" issues and funds for the ELCA World Hunger Appeal. They will stop at each of the 65 Synods. **Their stop in our synod in Redwood Falls will be Monday, August 17 and they will leave the next morning, August 18 for the St. Paul synod. I am working with others on the hunger team and Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Redwood Falls to coordinate this event.**

There are three main things individuals and congregations can do:

1. Pray for the Revs on their journey.
2. Prior to their visit to our synod, hold a fund-raising event and possibly a health and wellness initiative in your congregation.
3. Attend an event in Redwood Falls on August 17. Details are tentative at this point but bicyclists from all over the region are invited to meet and escort the Revs the last several miles into town. (about 3-4 PM). There will be a Whopper Feed at Gloria Dei from (about 5-7 PM) as a fund raiser for ELCA World Hunger Appeal. We will also be collecting offerings for the ELCA World Hunger Appeal and food for the local food shelf in Redwood Falls. The Revs will be on hand during the Whopper Feed with their bike for informal visiting. There will be a presentation by the Revs in the early evening. More details later, please watch the Southwestern Minnesota Synod E-Newsletter.

Our hope is that all 269 congregations will participate in this wonderful initiative. The Revs hope to raise 5 million dollars, above and beyond what is already given. Based on current giving, this would get us to the \$25 million goal of ELCA World Hunger Appeal. I pray that each congregation will host an event or set aside an offering to help support the Tour de Rev's mission.

Each congregation is welcome to create their own event but I know that you are very busy...[ideas for congregations followed in this section.]
